

General Information

Cass City Middle School is a configuration of grades 5 through 8. Cass City Middle School is committed to meeting the needs of early adolescents and preparing students for success as life long learners in a diverse society. Cass City Middle School received a letter grade of an "A" on the state report card. Adequate Yearly Progress was met for the 2009 – 2010 school year.

Fall student count for the 2009 - 2010 school year was 335 students. Students by grade: (72) 5th graders, (78) 6th graders, (94) 7th graders and (91) 8th graders. The **average class size** for 5th grade was 24 students, 6th grade was 26 students, 7th grade was 23.5 students and 8th grade was 22.8 students.

<u>Winter student count</u> showed an increase of 4 students to a total of 339 in grades 5 - 8. (71) 5th graders, (85) 6th graders, (90) 7th graders and (93) 8th graders.

Spring student count declined by 6 students for a total of 333: (72) 5th graders, (83) 6th graders, (85) 7th graders and (93) 8th graders. Average class sizes at the end of the school year were: 5th grade- 24 students, 6th grade- 27.7 students, 7th grade- 21.3 students, 8th grade- 23.3 students.

Ratio of boys to girls: There were 173 boys (52%) and 160 girls (48%) based on the spring student count.

<u>Retentions</u> for the 2009 – 2010 school year are as follows: 5^{th} grade (1), 6th grade (2), 7th grade (3) and 8^{th} grade (2). Students are considered to be retained if they fail any core subject. Successful completion of Compass Learning over the summer and passing the post test under the guidance of the principal will be accepted for promotion.

<u>**Title I students:**</u> Cass City Middle School changed from a Targeted Assistance Title 1 school to a Schoolwide Title 1 school for the 2009 - 2010 school year. This means that all students get assistance from school staff using federal dollars instead of only those students "targeted" for assistance.

Free and/or Reduced lunch 203 CCMS students (61% of the student population) were part of the Free and/or Reduced Lunch program at the end of the 2009 - 2010 school year.



- 1. Improve reading comprehension scores by increasing by 20% the number of students who go from Emerging to Established on AIMSweb Assessment.
- 2. 80% of CCMS students will be in Tier 1 for writing by the spring of 2010. (80%/15%/5%)
- 3. All students will achieve 85% or above on the MEAP assessment in the area of math.
- 4. Every grade will show an increase of 10% from fall to spring in math (Above and Below Target).
- 5. All students will achieve 90% or above on the MEAP assessment in the area of science.
- 6. Improve MEAP scores by 5% (grades 6, 9) in the area of social studies by increasing the number of students who score Level 1 or Level 2.

Specific Reading Objectives for 2009 – 2010

- 1. 80% of students in all grades will score in the Tier 1 level in fluency and comprehension, 15% in Tier 2 and 5% in Tier 3.
- 2. 45% of all students in all grades will achieve Level 1 on the MEAP in reading.

Specific Behavior Objectives for 2009 – 2010

- 1. Maintain an average referral rate below the national average of 3.08 major referrals per day.
- 2. Utilize the middle school Behavioral Team to assess and implement behavioral interventions.
- 3. Train at least one middle school staff member in each grade in CHAMPS class-room behavioral program.



Professional Development

Staff at Cass City Middle School has been very active in professional development this year. Examples of workshops and training that staff participated in were: Student Achievement Model (math and writing), MiBLSi (reading and positive behavioral support), complete mapping of math curriculum, Mapping of new science and social studies curriculum, Compass Learning, Using and Understanding Data, Special Education (new IEP's), Step Up To Writing, Read Naturally and Understanding Autism . In addition the staff attended an Anita Archer presentation dealing with motivating students.

Professional qualifications of staff:

All staff (100%) at Cass City Middle School is highly qualified under the federal legislation of No Child Left Behind. In the 2009 - 2010 school year, CCMS had a total of 21 certified teachers working in our building: (3) special education teachers, (17) regular education teachers and (1) full time Title I teacher. We also had (1) teacher that taught one hour of Spanish to our 8th grade students. One full time social worker was also available to handle student needs. There was one (1) staff member under probationary contract this year. In addition to the regular classroom staff, we also had (7) full time Para professionals working in our building. Three of these Para professionals were hired with ARRA Stimulus dollars
