

General Information

Cass City Middle School is a configuration of grades 5 through 8. Cass City Middle School is committed to meeting the needs of early adolescents and preparing students for success as life long learners in a diverse society. Cass City Middle School received a letter grade of an "A" on the state report card. Adequate Yearly Progress was met for the 2010 – 2011 school year.

<u>Fall student</u> count for the 2010 - 2011 school year was 316 students. Students by grade: (74) 5th graders, (71) 6th graders, (84) 7th graders and (87) 8th graders. The <u>average class size</u> for 5th grade was 23.8 students, 6th grade was 22.5 students, 7th grade was 26.6 students and 8th grade was 27.6 students.

<u>Winter student count</u> showed an increase of 1 student for a total of 317 in grades 5 - 8. (74) 5^{th} graders, (70) 6^{th} graders, (87) 7^{th} graders and (86) 8^{th} graders.

Spring student count declined by 1 student for a total of 316: (76) 5th graders, (69) 6th graders, (85) 7th graders and (86) 8th graders. **Average class sizes** at the end of the school year were: 5th grade- 24.6 students, 6th grade- 22.3 students, 7th grade- 27 students, 8th grade- 28.3 students.

Ratio of boys to girls: There were 155 boys (49%) and 161 girls (51%) based on the spring student count.

<u>Retentions</u> for the 2010 – 2011 school year are as follows: 5th grade (1), 6th grade (4), 7th grade (9) and 8th grade (8). Students are considered to be retained if they fail any core subject. Successful completion of Compass Learning over the summer and passing the post test under the guidance of the principal will be accepted for promotion.

<u>Title I students:</u> Cass City Middle School changed from a Targeted Assistance Title 1 school to a Schoolwide Title 1 school in the 2009 – 2010 school year. This means that all students get assistance from school staff using federal dollars instead of only those students "targeted" for assistance.

<u>Free and/or Reduced lunch</u> 180 CCMS students (57% of the student population) were part of the Free and/or Reduced Lunch program at the end of the 2010 - 2011 school year.

PROCESS FOR ASSIGNING PUPILS TO THE SCHOOL

Students who have successfully completed the Fourth Grade requirements are promoted to the Middle School.

School Improvement Goals 2010 - 2011

- Maintain our Tier I students while decreasing our Tier 2 students by 10% and decreasing our Tier 3 students by 5% in reading fluency. This goal will be measured using the Spring Assessments of AIMSweb data scores.
- Improve reading comprehension scores by increasing by 20% the students who go from Emerging to Established using Student Achievement Model Aimsweb assessment.
- 85% of middle school students will be in Tier 1 for writing (SAM Model) by the end of the year.
- All students will achieve 85% or better on the MEAP in the area of math and remain at that level for the 2010-2011 school year. The goal will be measured using MEAP assessment.
- All students will show adequate progress in all areas of MEAP with an increase of five percentage
 points in the number of students who meet or exceed proficiency standards as measured by the
 MEAP (Michigan Educational Assessment Program) and continue for the 2010-2011 school year.

Specific Reading Objectives for 2010 – 2011

- 1. 80% of students in all grades will score in the Tier 1 level in fluency and comprehension, 15% in Tier 2 and 5% in Tier 3.
- 2. 40% of all students in all grades will achieve Level 1 on the MEAP in reading.

Specific Behavior Objectives for 2010 – 2011

- 1. Maintain an average referral rate below the national average of 2.69 major referrals per day.
- 2. Utilize the middle school Behavioral Team to assess and implement behavioral interventions.
- 3. Train at least one middle school staff member in each grade in CHAMPS class-room behavioral program.

Cass City Middle School: School Improvement Plan

The School Improvement Plan is an evolving document that is changed from year to year to address the various and changing goals of the Middle School. Each year a plan is put into place to reflect upon past accomplishments and implement the strategies and goals for the upcoming school year. Copies of the School Improvement are available upon request in the Middle School Principal's office.



Professional Development

Staff at Cass City Middle School have been very active in professional development this year. Examples of workshops and training that staff participated in were: Student Achievement Model (math and writing), MiBLSi (reading and positive behavioral support), complete mapping of Language Arts curriculum, Compass Learning, Using and Understanding Data, Special Education (new IEP's), Step Up To Writing, Read Naturally, Understanding Autism, utilizing Technology, and practicing our medical emergency response. A great deal of emphasis has been placed on aligning curriculum with the Core National Standards.

Professional qualifications of staff:

All staff (100%) at Cass City Middle School are highly qualified under the federal legislation of No Child Left Behind. In the 2010 - 2011 school year, CCMS had a total of 18 certified teachers working in our building: (3) special education teachers, (14) regular education teachers and (1) full time Title I teacher. We also had a(1) teacher who taught one hour of Art to our 8th grade students, a teacher (1) who taught Introduction to Psychology/Sociology for one hour to our 7th graders, and a teacher (1) who taught an hour of Technology/Rosetta Stone to our 5th grade students. One full time social worker was also available to handle student needs. There were three (3) staff members under probationary contract this year. In addition to the regular classroom staff, we also had six (6) full time Para professionals working in our building. Four (4) of these Para-pros were assigned to work with specific grade levels to provide interventions.



Parent Involvement

The Cass City Public School District supports parental involvement as both a valuable resource and as an important part in the learning process of our students. We consider parents/guardians essential partners in the educational and psycho-social development of their children.

Parent-Teacher Conferences

Regularly scheduled parent conferences were held in October, November, and February of the past school year. During the course of the school year there were 226 parent-teacher contacts made during the parent/teacher conferences. Approximately sixty-five percent of our student body were represented by these contacts. An open house was held for parents of incoming 5th graders in August and for parents of 6th-8th graders in September.

- 5th grade students participated in **Colonial Days** activities in conjunction with their social studies curriculum.

- Dee Tibbits also presented a **Luau Day** for the 5th grade in the spring
- This was the 15^{th} year that our 8^{th} graders have taken the trip to **Washington D.C**. This year's trip took place on June 9 14. 36 students and 18 adults made the trip this year.
- The **Kally Maharg Scholarship** was awarded to (split) between twelve different students to help defray the cost of the Washington D.C. trip. This year's wreath layers for the Washington D.C. trip were: Erica Martin, Rebecca Graff, Elizabeth Venema, and Erin Zdrojewski.
- 7th grade students traveled to **Apple Mountain** ski resort on January 20th for a day of skiing and fun which coincided with their ELA, science and physical education curriculums.
- 7th grade held their annual **math carnival** in May.
- 5th grade students met their goal for **Reading Counts** during the school year. As a result, Mr. Markel (MS Principal), performed as Lady Gaga at an assembly to celebrate the success of the 5th grade.
- 8th grade students visited **Cedar Point** on June 3rd.
- 5th grade students spent two days and one night at the **Fowler Center**. Core curriculum was learned using hands on activities.
- A school wide **spelling bee** sponsored by the Knights of Columbus was held in November: 5th/6th grade winner was Megan Graham, 7th/8th grade winner was Aaron McClorey.
- All **drills** were conducted efficiently, they included: 6 fire drills, 2 tornado drills, 2 lockdown drills, and a Code Blue Drill (Medical response drill).
- **Assemblies** such as the Underage Drinking Assembly and PEP (Post-Educational Preparation) Assembly provided students with important information pertaining things that take place outside of CCMS.
- On September 28th several students and staff members attended a **Healthy Youth Summit** at Ford Field.
- MEAP scores were once again above state averages and among the highest in Tuscola and Huron Counties.
- Cass City Middle School was featured at a meeting of the State Board of Education on April 22nd as a school that is "Beating the Odds" for continued outstanding academic performance.
